**ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

*Federal Register*

- contains all executive agency final and proposed regulations, presidential proclamations and executive orders, and all notices and other documents which the President determines have general applicability or which Congress requires to be published in the *Federal Register*
- published every weekday throughout the year except on federal holidays
- available as follows:
  - Print: XXKF70.A2 (Second Floor Reading Room)
  - Westlaw: FR Database
  - LexisNexis: FEDREG Database

*Code of Federal Regulations*

- compilation of all regulations currently in effect – arranged by subject with 50 titles
- revised annually, with a portion of the titles issued at the beginning of each calendar quarter
  - to update, consult the *List of CFR Sections Affected*
- available as follows:

  - Westlaw: CFR Database
  - LexisNexis: CFR Database

*List of CFR Sections Affected*

- allows the user to see if any changes have been made to a particular regulation (or proposed regulation) in the *Federal Register* since the print publication date of the relevant CFR title
- organized by CFR title – lists the *Federal Register* page number(s) where any modification(s) to a particular regulation are indicated
- published monthly – to update, consult the most recent daily *Federal Register*, which will list all CFR sections affected since the date of the last *List of CFR Sections Affected*

## **STATE REGULATIONS**

The D'Angelo Law Library does not maintain print copies of the administrative codes of most states. State administrative codes can be found on Westlaw (e.g., the IL-ADC Database) and LexisNexis (e.g., the ILADMN Database). In addition, the Library's "State Law" web page (<http://www.lib.uchicago.edu/e/law/state.html>) provides links to a number of state administrative codes that be accessed through official governmental web sites. Table T.1 of the *Bluebook* lists the names of each state's administrative compilations (e.g., Utah Administrative Code, Code of Vermont Rules).

## **LOCAL LAWS**

In addition to federal and state regulations, many local governmental units, such as counties, cities and towns, also have their own laws, which are sometimes called "ordinances." There is no comprehensive single source for local laws, although many county and city ordinances can be accessed for free through web sites such as the LexisNexis Municipal Codes Web Library (<http://www.bpcnet.com/codes.htm>), and the Municipal Code Corporation's Municode.com site (<http://www.municode.com/Resources/Online%20Library.asp>). Many municipalities also post their ordinances on their own web sites, and links to the web sites of numerous cities, towns, and villages are provided by Piper Resources on its State and Local Government on the Net web site (<http://www.statelocalgov.net>).
