Getting to Know Your Law Library

- You should answer *at least four (4) of the questions* below prior to the library orientation session on Wednesday. You will not need to submit your written answers.
- You should use the D'Angelo Law Library web site, www.lib.uchicago.edu/e/law/, to answer the questions.
- You should not spend more than thirty (30) minutes working on these questions.
- You may stop by the D'Angelo Law Library reference desk or use Ask a Law Librarian, <http://www.lib.uchicago.edu/e/law/using/reference/ask.html>, for assistance.
- The librarians will discuss the questions and answers during the orientation session on Wednesday.

1. Use the **Library Catalog** to find the book, ***The Endurance of National Constitutions*, by Professor Tom Ginsburg**. How many copies of this book does the Library own? Is it also available online as an electronic book?

2. Use the **Lens Search** to find books and other library resources on **comparative constitutional law** which are available at the D'Angelo Law Library. How many books did you find that were published in 2011?

3. Find **previous Law School exams** on the D'Angelo web page. Are previous exams available for **Professor Henderson's Federal Regulation of Securities** course?

4. Locate a **D'Angelo Law Library research guide on environmental law**. Does this guide include books on international environmental law available on reserve in the library?

5. Use **LexisNexis or Westlaw** to find the **United States Supreme Court's opinion in Miranda v. Arizona**. Is there more than one legal citation reference to this Court's opinion and, if so, which legal citation is preferred for use in your papers?

6. Use the **Library's E-Journals** search to find a PDF of the published version of R.H. Coase, "The Problem of Social Cost" 3 *Journal of Law and Economics* 1(1960). Is the article available in more than one database?

7. Use **LexisNexis, Westlaw or HeinOnline** to find journal articles by one of the professors whose course you will take this quarter.
