Re: What's happening in the Library (news for Autumn 2007)

Greetings from the Library! This quarter I'd like to highlight a few tools to assist you in your research: **LibX** and **Google Scholar**. What, a librarian promoting Google?! Yes, read on.... I'd also like to highlight some religious studies resources at the Center for Research Libraries, located right here in Hyde Park. Finally, I'd like to advertise several opportunities for library tours/orientation sessions.

LibX is a **Firefox extension** that provides direct access to resources at the University of Chicago Library. It adds a toolbar and right-click context menu, which you can use to search the library's catalog from any webpage within the Firefox web browser. According to the [Google Scholar](#) website, "Google Scholar provides a simple way to broadly search for scholarly literature. From one place, you can search across many disciplines and sources: peer-reviewed papers, theses, books, abstracts and articles, from academic publishers, professional societies, preprint repositories, universities and other scholarly organizations." LibX combines with Google Scholar to redirect users to electronic materials licensed or purchased by the Library using the "Find It! @ UChicago" link within Google Scholar. To set this up, go to Google Scholar and click scholar preferences. Under library links, select University of Chicago Library. If you're using RefWorks or EndNote, you can also choose one of these under bibliography manager. This will give you a link to export a title from your results list directly into RefWorks or EndNote. Pretty cool, huh?

As you may have heard, the University of Chicago Library is part of a twelve university consortium (CIC) which is joining the **Google Books Library Project**. For more information, see the University's [press release](#). If you haven't checked out [Google Book Search](#), I encourage you to do so. A growing number of books, including some classics in religious studies, are available in a variety of views. If the book is out of copyright or Google has obtained permission, you will see a full-text view. If the book is protected by copyright, you will be able to see only a limited preview. There are similar collections by [Project Gutenberg](#) and [Internet Archive](#).

The [Center for Research Libraries](#) (CRL) has a fairly large collection of materials in religious studies. CRL is a consortium of university, college, and independent research libraries, which acquires resources for research and teaching and makes them available to its member institutions, including the University of Chicago. "Religion in the Modern World" is the theme of CRL's [summer 2007 newsletter](#). It includes a very brief overview of CRL's holdings in religious studies including primary source materials on Christian missions, resources on Islam and Judaism (including recently acquired Israeli dissertations), and Tibetan language resources. Please check the [CRL library catalog](#) for additional titles. To request an item, place an interlibrary loan request via [WorldCat](#) or complete an [online form](#). Please add a note that the item is available from CRL.

If you are new to the Divinity School or would like a library refresher, I invite you to attend one of four **library tour and orientation sessions**, which provide a brief overview of the library's collections and services. We will begin in JRL153 with a hands-on overview of the Library's webpage and conclude in the Special Collections Research Center (SCRC) with a display of a variety of materials, including items from the collected papers of Martin Marty's mentor, Franz Bibfeldt. Tours will be held:

On **September 26 and 27 from 2:00-4:00 PM** the Library will have a special opportunity to **"soup up" your laptop** and make your research much simpler. Look for a special help desk in the Regenstein lobby where someone will assist you in downloading software so that you can print from your laptop to one of the library's printers, configuring Write-N-Cite (a RefWorks add-on) so that you can use it with your word processing program, downloading LibX to use in Firefox. They will also answer any other questions you may have. Want some help getting started with RefWorks?
