The thing to do is to take a Greyhound Sightseeing Tour of the Fair Grounds first. Then go back and see the exhibits you're interested in.

The Greyhound Sightseeing Tour will give

you a complete view of the entire Fair Grounds, from end to end.

Starting at the North Entrance, on 12th Street, the Greyhound Sightseeing route travels right down the Main Promenade, to the South Entrance. The buses



Two Kinds of Service Within the Grounds—By GREYHOUND BUS

World's Fair Greyhound Lines is the ONLY land transportation system within the World's Fair Grounds. All automobiles and other vehicles are barred.

Sixty specially-designed Greyhound coaches cover the Fair completely, giving TWO different types of service.

Greyhound Rapid Transit System:

A regular bus system, with buses running every half-minute to three minutes, stopping at designated stations. One line covers the Mainland from end to end running on a special Rapid Transit Highway which passes close to all Fair Buildings and is kept clear of pedestrians.

A separate Rapid Transit line serves Northerly Island, starting on the Mainland near the North Entrance, traversing the entire Island and re-crossing to the Mainland at 23d Street.

The fare is Ten Cents a ride.

Greyhound Sightseeing Service:

A complete tour of the entire Grounds, with guide and lecturer. The BEST way to see the whole Fair in a short time. For details, see inside pages.

The Greyhound Sightseeing Tour will give you a complete view of

the entire Fair Grounds, from end to end.

Starting at the North Entrance, on 12th Street, the Greyhound Sightseeing route travels right down the Main Promenade, to the South Entrance. The buses

double back on the same route as far as the 23d Street bridge. Here they cross over the South Lagoon, traverse Northerly Island, and finally cross back over the Planetarium bridge to the starting point at the North Entrance.

On their route, the buses pass every important building, exhibit, amusement and show in the Fair.

A trained guide-lecturer tells

you all about each exhibit as you pass it. At points of particular interest, buses come to a stop while the guide points out and explains unique features. The lecturers are all college men, fully informed about the Fair and everything in it. To avoid too many interruptions, sightseers may board buses only at a few points.



Buses roll along about 5 miles per hour, so you have plenty of time to see everything, and bus seats are arranged in a double row, back to back along the coach, so everybody faces outward and all can see clearly.

The Greyhound Sightseeing Tour and Lecture lasts about an hour. It shows you everything there is to see at the Fair. It's the best introduction

you could possibly have to the greatest World's Fair in history—

and the cost is only Fifty Cents!

Sightseeing trips will operate every day, except when unusually large crowds on the Main Promenade make it physically impossible to run ceaches.

The Greyhound Sightseeing Tours are entirely separate from the Greyhound Rapid Transit System. Rapid Transit buses give regular bus service throughout the Grounds.

A complete map of all hus service within the Fair Grounds appears on the inside pages of this folder. Read it and SAVE it. It is a complete guide to all land transportation within the grounds.


