## GENERAL INFORMATION

The registration and information desk is located in the North Lounge of the Reynolds Club, 5706 South University Avenue. It will be open from 8:30 to 5:00 from Monday, November 23, to Saturday, November 28. Registrants should make seating arrangements for the Centennial and Thanksgiving dinners at the seating desk next to the registration desk.

Tickets for "Time Will Tell" are on sale at the Reynolds Club Box Office. All other Centennial events are limited to persons who have registered in advance. Admission to all events will be by ticket only.

Special programs will be distributed for the panel discussions, the Institute for High School Biology Teachers, and "Time Will Tell."

The Society for the Study of Evolution is holding its annual meeting during the Celebration, with headquarters at the Shoreland Hotel. Its sessions are listed in a separate program.

To reach a wider audience The Encyclopaedia Britannica Films, Inc., is filming the Celebration events to develop documentary films and educational material for distribution among groups unable to attend. WUCB, the student-operated campus radio station, is tape-recording the panel discussions and lectures and broadcasting these through closed circuit to Breasted Hall for the audience there. The University of Chicago Press is publishing the centennial papers and the panel discussions as a three-volume work titled *Evolution after Darwin* and edited by Sol Tax.

Transportation is available by taxi (Yellow Cab, Midway 3-8650); Emery-Drexel Livery service (FAirfax 4-6400); Chicago Transit Authority bus running east-west on 55th Street (CTA bus #55); and Illinois Central commuter train to the Loop.

Chartered bus service directly to and from the Shoreland and the Windermere hotels will be available to registrants from Tuesday through Saturday. Tickets must be purchased in advance. Registrants are advised to purchase a supply of tickets (25 cents each) at once (money will be refunded for those unused) and to plan to use the bus early to avoid waiting, congestion, and loss of reserved seats at sessions. Breakfast at Hutchinson Commons will be found to be especially convenient.

### ON THE UNIVERSITY CAMPUS

#### REYNOLDS CLUB, SOUTH LOUNGE

*University of Chicago Library Exhibit.* The history of evolutionary theory and the influence of Darwin's writings on social thought and theology are shown in a book exhibit assembled by the Department of Special Collections of the University Library. Among the books on display from the Library's collections are first editions of seventeen of Darwin's works, including the *Origin of Species*, presented to the University by Col. William M. Spencer of Chicago.

*University of California at Los Angeles Exhibit.* A series of posters loaned by the University of California at Los Angeles Biomedical Library illustrates Darwin's precursors, his life and work, and contemporary reaction to his theories, and post-Darwinian developments in genetics, embryology, physical anthropology and psychology.

### IN AND NEAR CHICAGO

#### CHICAGO NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

"Darwin's *Origin of Species*" is the subject of an exhibit in Stanley Field Hall. It consists of six panels that trace the history of the *Origin* and explain the meaning of, and the evidence for, natural selection. Included in the exhibit is a copy of the first edition of the *Origin of Species* loaned for the occasion by the John Crerar Library of Chicago. Original letters by Darwin and specimens from the Museum's collections that were collected by him on the voyage of the "Beagle" will also be on display. The Museum, at Roosevelt Road and Lake Shore Drive, can be reached by car or by the Illinois Central Railroad's commuter trains.

THE MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY, at 57th Street and South Lake Shore Drive, contains both scientific (including medical) and historical exhibits.

#### CHICAGO ZOÖLOGICAL PARK (BROOKFIELD ZOO)

Members of the staff will be glad to arrange escorted tours which would include the Animal Hospital and Animal Study Center as well as the regular displays. For further information and arrangement of tours, call Bishop 2-2630. The zoo is about one hour by car (west on 55th Street and Garfield Boulevard to Harlem Avenue, north on Harlem to 31st Street, 31st to 8300 west) and can also be reached by Bluebird Bus from the Loop.

THE MORTON ARBORETUM, Lisle, Illinois, contains 1,225 acres devoted to the study and exhibit of woody plants.

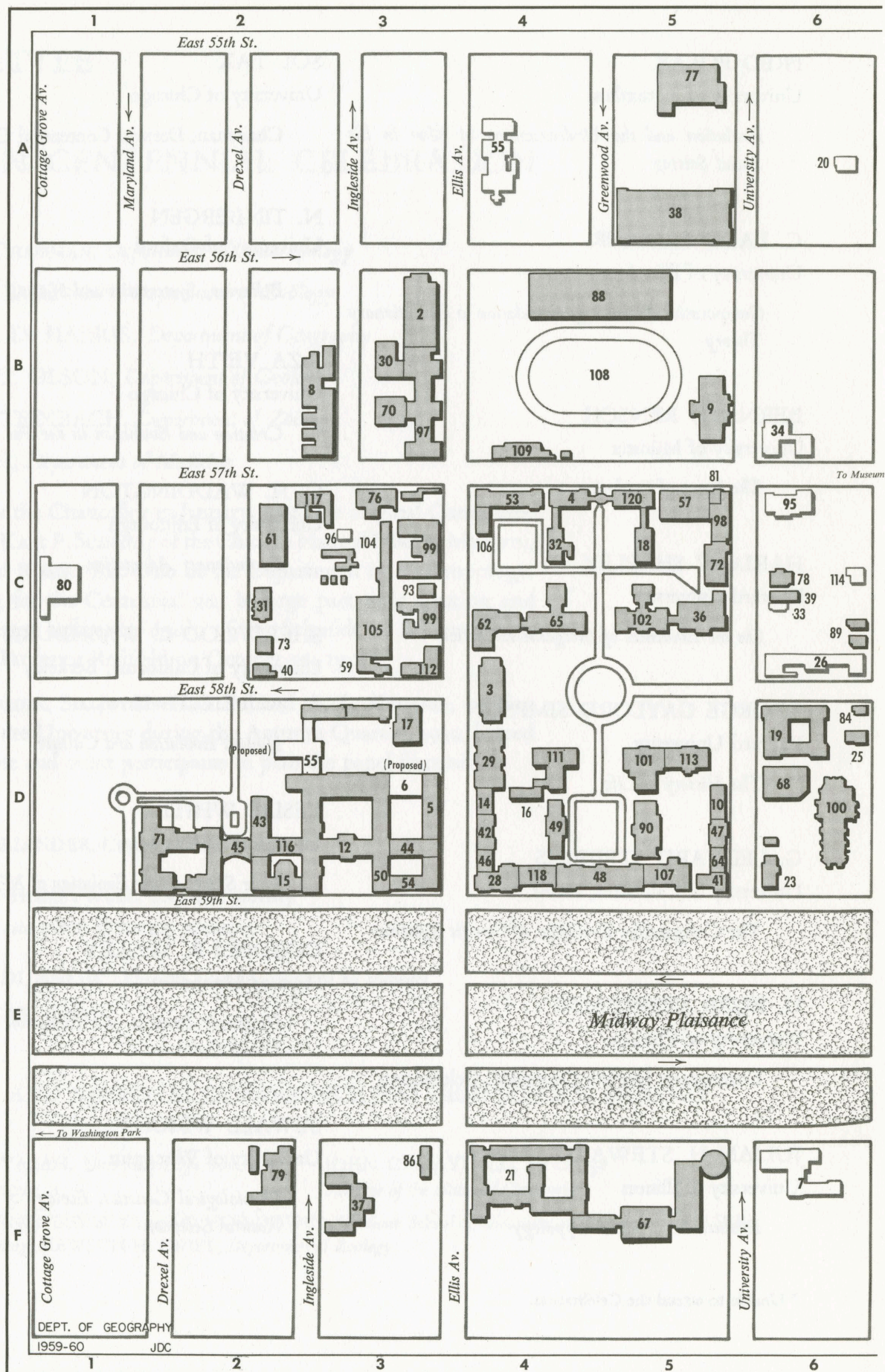

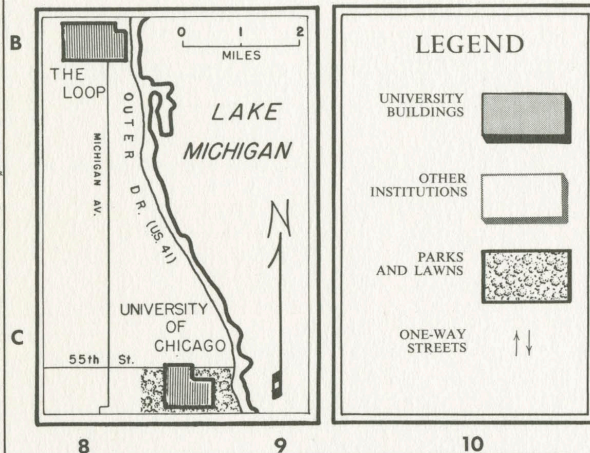
