## EXPLANATIONS AND NOTES.

1. **Date of Opening.**—The work of the Law School begins October 1, 1902.
2. **Location.**—Pending the erection of its own building the Law School will be located in the Press Building, corner of Ellis avenue and Fifty-eighth street.
3. **Requirements for Admission.**
  - a) Admission to the pre-legal course is granted to students who have had two years of college work.
  - b) Admission to the professional course is granted to students who have completed at least three years of college work.
  - c) Students entitled to enter under b) who have done work at other law schools in good standing will receive credit for work done at such schools.
  - d) Persons over twenty-one years of age may be admitted as special students if they show good reason for not entering upon the regular course.
4. **Degrees.**
  - a) The degree of A.B. or Ph.B. is granted to law students who successfully complete the first year of the professional curriculum.
  - b) The degree of J.D. is granted to students who having previously obtained the degree of A.B. or Ph.B., successfully complete the professional curriculum.
  - c) Special students are not received as candidates for the degree of J.D. If qualified for admission to the Junior Colleges they may be accepted as candidates for the degree of LL.B. The degree is granted only if the candidate maintains a high standing in his work.
5. **Fees.**

Matriculation fee, \$5.

Tuition fee: \$50 per quarter for the professional curriculum; \$40 per quarter for the pre-legal curriculum. This fee is for regular work, three Majors or their equivalent. There will be no reduction to those taking less than the regular work, but more than one Major. A reduction is made in case of students taking only one Major (or equivalent), one-half of the full tuition fee being charged.

Courses in the Colleges and in the Schools of Arts, Literature, and Science are open to students of the Law School without extra charge.

Fees are due and payable on or before the first day of each quarter. They are payable to the Registrar, Cobb Lecture Hall, Room A1.
6. **Time and Place of Registration.**

Students will register with the Dean at the Dean's office, third floor of Press Building, on September 29, 30, and October 1, 9:00-12:00 A.M.
