D. Sir.

Your letter of the 6th inst, I rec^d. to day - I would not consent, in any event, to have my name used for an appointment, in opposition to that of Judge Dewey. Should there be a vacancy in the office of the Com^r of the Genl Land Office, and you shall think it a proper occasion to use my name, I should regard it as a compliment, and trust I should feel grateful for it.

According to your suggestion, I have this day written to the Hon R. W. Thompson.

You will have learned that Mr Clements has taken your place in the Convention - We are now in midst of the Banking question - We have spent eight days in the discussion - and from every appearance, are farther apart than when the discussion commenced - The excitement in the Convention reached that point this afternoon, that the President assumed the extraordinary power of adjourning the Convention until Monday morning
