

- Under this roof we have brought together everything entering into the production of printing—copy-writing, art, photography, design, typesetting, engraving, electrotyping, printing, lithography, binding, mail-

Here we have every facility to produce, from start to finish, any size of printing order (from carloads of mail order catalogs and telephone directories, through the gamut of encyclopaedias, books of all kinds, catalogs and advertising printing, to 100 invitations tastefully appropriate—to the meetings of your favorite club), and by any method of printing.

• If you will look about you in this exhibit you will see speci-

mens of the almost limitless variety of printing we do. Further if you will examine the humblest of these specimens you will see that, although the material and method used may be the cheapest, the result is tasteful and effective. 

give us the order, or a catalog which must be delivered 100,000 a day starting after several weeks, the job moves, click by click, to a completion at the time we have promised it to you.



The Lakeside Press, Twenty-eight Acres of Floor Space, Full of Modern, Efficient Machinery




A Row of Rotary Printing Presses


upon our product the unmistakable mark of the master craftsman.

• It was our desire to hearten the machine binder in the practice of his craft, and in so doing to raise the standard of quality of our machine binding, that prompted us to start a department of fine hand binding. That we have succeeded beyond our hopes is evidenced by the


examples of machine binding you will see in this exhibit. And as a by-product of our effort to rehabilitate the craft of machine binding we have today what is probably the best hand bindery in the country and one of the best in the world. In this bindery the most highly skilled artistbinders repair or bind books for collectors in all parts of the country; the cost of binding a single volume may vary from a few dollars to occasionally as

much as several hundred dollars.

- · When we built our present building we set aside, primarily for the benefit and education of our own employees, four large rooms as The Lakeside Press Galleries, where from time to time we have exhibitions of fine printing, rare or fine books, paintings, posters, prints, and other things related to our trade.
- At the present time we have an International Exhibition of fine printing by designers and presses


