Petition by union for back pay for Beaulie  
Gytowicz, #3333, Factory C.

This girl was hired June 15th as a sleeve  
sewer, but because of her lack of experience, she  
sewed in felt, stitched in yokes, and piped bottoms.  
Her wage was \$14.00 per week. Later, she was  
assigned to machine made buttonholes where she is  
earning \$18.00 to \$19.00 per week piece work.

The people contend she is entitled to \$3.00  
raise for week workers, while the company claims  
she falls in class of "inexperienced workers  
employed less than three months."

It appears that she worked some years ago as  
a hand sewer for the company and has worked for  
three months as sleeve sewer by machine for another  
house. That was three years ago. Since that time  
until June 15th, she did not work at the trade.

Under the circumstances, the Trade Board finds  
that her preparation for such work was not  
sufficient to bring her within classification of  
experienced workers, and that she has no claim there-  
fore on the \$3.00 raise for week workers. Petition  
is denied.
