May. Gen Thomas,  
Com'd Dept, Cumberland:

Dear sir: I enclose a line to my son, informing him of the good health of his Mother and sisters, which I will thank you to convey to him, as I am told he is in your command.

Gov Johnson proposes, if the regiment is sent back to him, to re-mount it, and send it forward again. There are about 700 of them, and only 50 mounted, as I am told.

I dislike to trouble you, but these people are clamorous for the opening of the Trade. I can only open the Trade here, upon your written approval I have no feeling on the subject, and leave the matter to your judgment, as you know best, where our lines will be established.
