Dear Sir -

I am not an "Orphans C. Case" myself and I believe none of my family are. A sudden impulse has, however, induced me to risk my character in this respect. Ayala's dispatch which has just (2 A. M.) arrived states that you are appointing physicians to examine applicants for Pensions. If it is not improper for me to do so & you have not designated any one else, may I recommend to your notice either my father Dr. Wm Perry or my brother Dr. Wm G. Perry, for these places in Exeter, N. H. My father is now the oldest Dr. in the State & knows every one almost personally within a circuit of forty miles. My brother has been in practice fifteen years, has studied in France & is every way well qualified. There are but two other regular physicians in the place one of whom is usually & almost retired from practice, the other not especially skilful.

As I have said above, I am acting entirely on my own responsibility & don't know but I am doing an indelicate

thing - However you know me well enough
to suppose that I would not intentionally
oppose against the proprietors. I am getting
along here just in the old way. We
are of course rather nervous about the
situation in Ky., but Abraham's production
has made us feel so happy, as to
diminish all local anxieties. The
Gazette was never more prosperous in
its circulation, & the Extra-Correspon-
dence journals will now have to bear the
burden of being factions & just finding-
time. But I must not trouble you any
