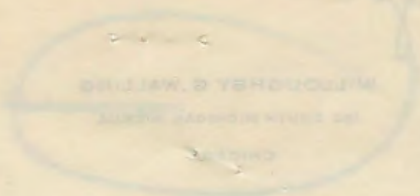

My dear Dr. Burton:

Former President Harry Pratt Judson, of the University of Chicago, in a letter to me last November suggested that it would be very desirable that a conference be arranged under the auspices of the Chicago Council of Social Agencies between representative of the Council and the Social Science Group of the University of Chicago, for the purpose of discussing the advisability of closer cooperation between the University and the various bodies engaged in research in the City of Chicago. I have been very glad to arrange such a conference, which was followed by other conferences, including representatives from the Chicago Community Trust and the Jewish Research Bureau, which organizations are engaged in making surveys and studies in the City of Chicago.

A joint Committee on Studies and Surveys has been organized by representatives of the University of Chicago, The Jewish Research Bureau, the Chicago Community Trust, and the Chicago Council of Social Agencies. This committee at a meeting held March 30th, decided upon two immediate and important steps to be taken toward a practical co-ordination of survey and study making. The committee authorized me to make formal request of the University of Chicago that the University accept the custodianship of survey and study reports and materials, and to compile the list of agencies and enterprises in Chicago making surveys and studies, and to index so far as practicable, studies and surveys already made by such agencies and enterprises.

The Committee believes that if this is done a basis will be formed for further development of co-operation and co-ordination in this important field of activity.
