Dear Miss Talbot:

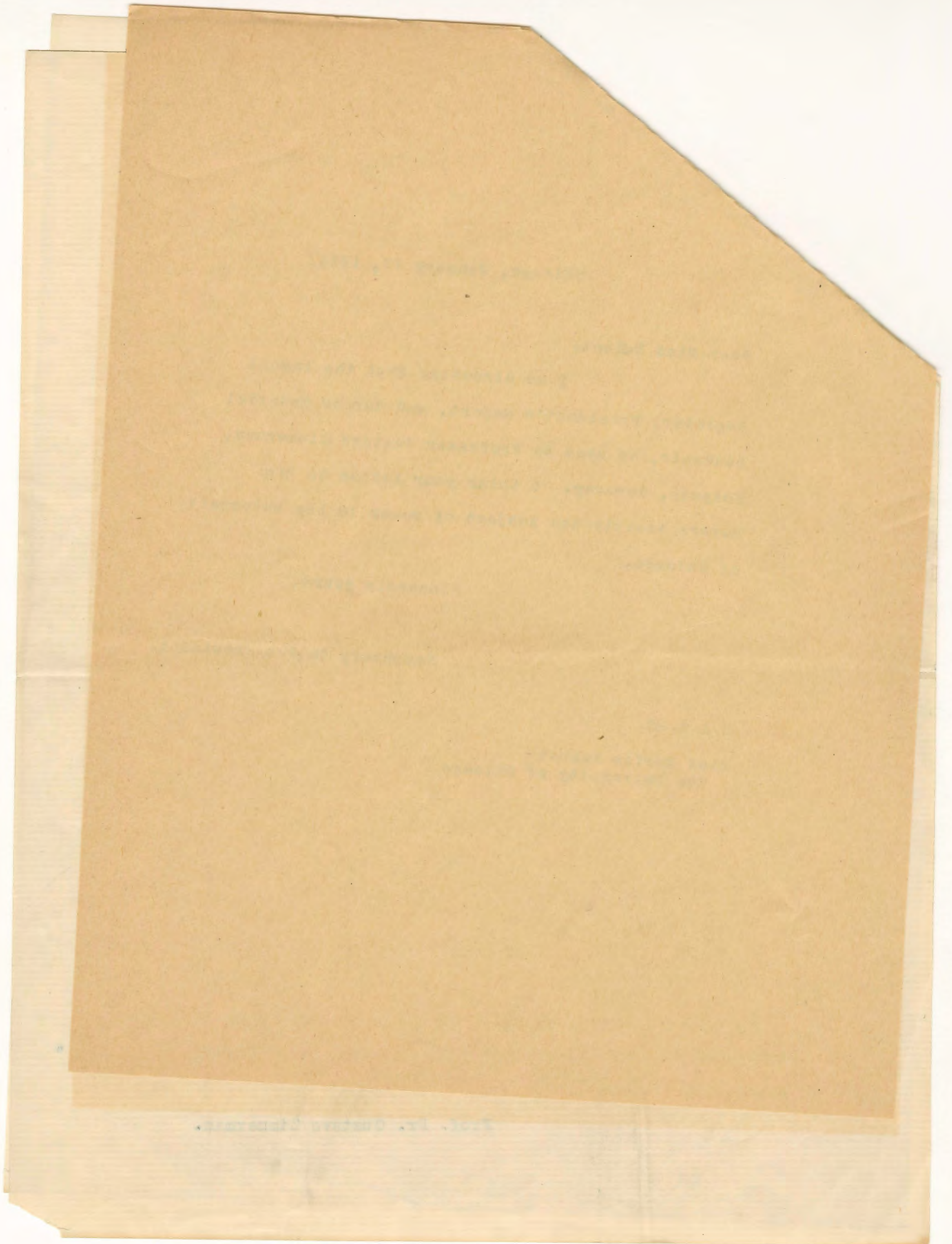
